

# Steven's Story – From customer to colleague



**We first met Steven when he moved into one of our Oldham PFI properties in 2017. Little did we know that two years later he would be supporting customers himself.**

Steven Keatley joined the Great Places Oldham PFI Team in October 2019 as a Caretaking Apprentice. However, Steven had been working with the team long before he applied for the role, as he has been an Oldham PFI tenant since he moved out of his family home in March 2017.

When Steven moved into his new home, he was introduced to Amjad (Neighbourhood Coordinator), who encouraged him to start volunteering with the Crossley Community Centre to help tackle the social isolation he was struggling with.

Volunteering at the Crossley Centre helped him immensely and through his hard work and dedication as a volunteer, Steven was encouraged to apply for the Caretaker Apprentice role.

Steven started his role as Caretaker Apprentice in October and immediately made his presence felt. He is fast

becoming an invaluable member of the caretaking team – offering his experiences as a PFI tenant to help improve caretaking service delivery.

As part of his role Steven attends Salford College every Thursday, which he is really enjoying, and at the end of his apprenticeship he will be a qualified Level 2 Property Maintenance Operative.

When we asked Steven how he is finding his role, he said: "I've really enjoyed my time at Great Places so far and I love who I work with. My colleagues have been nothing but welcoming and supportive since my first day here. I really appreciate being given the opportunity to learn the role of a caretaker and I hope to secure long term employment at Great Places."

Amjad added : "It's been an absolute pleasure working with Steven, who on a daily basis presents an infectious positive attitude that spreads to his colleagues helping create a joyful atmosphere.

"Clearly ambitious, senior management figures need to be worried about Steven coming for their positions!"

## Primrose Bank and Wainsford Walk Parking court

Following on from previous letters, newsletter articles in *Inspired Living* and a meeting held at the Primrose Centre last year where a proposal to review the parking court gates took place, this was to discuss the ongoing issue with the damage the gates were enduring.

It was discussed the best option to reduce the level of damage was to remove the motor drives as this was the main element that was being continually damaged. Over the following months the parking court gates on Primrose bank and Wainsford Walk (Keswick site) continued to suffer vandalism and required numerous expensive repairs. After spending over £40,000 repairing these gates the decision was made by the consortium to remove the automatic feature and convert the gates to a manual operation. The security of the gates has not been lost unless the gates are not closed after being used.

A number of gates have now been converted and these are as follows:

- » Chamber Road (lower end)
- » Chamber Road (rear of Olivia Terrace)
- » Lee Street
- » Foxglove Avenue
- » Wainsford Walk (Keswick)

The gates will be converted to a manual operation and will continue to be secured by a magnetic lock, any residents who have use of the parking courts

have been issued with a new fob to allow the gates to be operated. The responsibility to ensure the gates are locked is with you, the user. Please note that replacement fobs will be provided, however if lost or damaged there will be a £20 charge for a replacement.

To operate the new gates please follow the process detailed below:

- » Present your fob to the reader, if recognised one of the gates (lead gate) will be released and the gate can then be manually opened. Once opened, put the drop bolt in place to stop the gate moving (i.e. during high winds). Once the lead gate has been opened, the second gate (slave gate) can then be opened (again this will have a drop down bolt to ensure the gate cannot move). You can now safely drive through the gate.
- » Once you have driven through the gate, the gates will need to be closed.
- » Lift the bolt of the second gate (slave gate) and close the gate, fit the drop down bolt in place to secure the gate.
- » Lift the bolt on lead gate, close the gate and the magnetic lock will engage securing the parking area. The gate can only be opened if the fob is presented to the reader (there will be one fitted inside and outside of the parking area to allow users to enter or leave when required).

# Oldham customers have their say at the latest CEO Roadshow



Oldham customers had the opportunity to quiz our Chief Exec, Matt Harrison, and PFI colleagues on a range of issues from complaints handling to antisocial behaviour at the recent CEO Roadshow held at the Primrose Community Centre.

Attendees also provided feedback on how Great Places can look to strengthen relationships and build trust with our customers. The workshop-style session generated some lively discussions, and was part of our work as 'early adopters' of the National Federation of Housing's Together with Tenants initiative. This centres on how the sector can build stronger customer relationships

and is in response to recommendations from last year's Government's Green Paper on Social Housing.

Customers' input will provide valuable insight that, alongside other Housing Associations, we will look to share with the Federation. This will then inform practical recommendations that can be rolled out by all Federation members moving forward.

The session also provided a valuable chance for Matt and Oldham colleagues to chat informally with customers and to update them on the latest news from Great Places and developments in their neighbourhoods.

### Gallery Oldham

Saturday 14 March until Sunday 31 May

Syd Shelton's photographs capture one of the most intriguing periods in British post-war history. Between 1976 and 1981, the movement Rock Against Racism (RAR) confronted racist ideology in the streets, parks and town halls of Britain.

RAR was formed by a collective of musicians and political activists to fight racism and fascism through music. Under the slogan 'Love Music, Hate Racism', it showcased reggae and punk bands on the same stage, attracting large multicultural audiences. Shelton photographed performers such as The Clash, Elvis Costello, Misty in Roots, Tom Robinson, Au Pairs and The Specials and their audience, as well as taking contextual social and cultural images that informed the politics of the movement across England and Ireland.

This exhibition revisits the energy of RAR and the creative alliances of black and white musicians, designers, writers, actors, performers and supporters towards a common goal. Shelton's photographs remind us that RAR was a particular treatise on belonging in Britain.

### Green Dividend has made a real difference to communities

**Over the last four years our Oldham's Green Dividend Fund has helped support 76 community projects across the borough. Dozens of Oldham residents have been in touch to find out how they can get involved in community gardening and growing projects – all in the spirit of 'doing their bit' to improve their neighbourhoods.**

To build on that success Council launched the Green Dividend Innovate, a separate pot of money used to improve greenspaces and areas neighbours use through green innovations.

Projects included creating more accessible shared spaces using renewable technologies, for example, using solar lighting to light a back alley, or creating wildlife habitats to promote biodiversity. Many of these innovative green projects are currently a work in progress.

Councillor Ateeque Ur-Rehman, Cabinet Member for Neighbourhood Services said: "One of Oldham's strengths is its people, the pride they take in their neighbourhoods and their willingness to pitch in and 'do their bit'.

"Residents are proud they live here, and the work carried out thanks to Green Dividend funding is a great example of that.

"People of all ages got involved to transform area and make a real difference".

The Green Dividend tied in with the Council's Green Oldham campaign, which encouraged residents and organisations to make environmentally conscious choices.

£306m investment strategy approved by Oldham Council

An ambitious plan to transform Oldham, including creating more than 2,000 new homes in the town centre, 1,000 new jobs and 100 apprenticeship opportunities, has been approved by Oldham Council.

The 'Creating a Better Place' vision will unlock £306m of investment across Oldham by focussing on building more homes for local people, delivering new jobs through town centre regeneration, and ensuring Oldham is a great place to visit and do business.

Oldham Council has undertaken a detailed review of the regeneration plans for the borough in order to strengthen the focus on building homes in the town centre. This means it will be able to meet the urgent need for more housing for residents – designed for a range of budgets and needs – by prioritising urban sites, and where possible, avoiding building on greenbelt land to protect the borough's much-loved open spaces.

'Creating a Better Place' is expected to significantly boost regeneration across the town centre, making it a destination of choice with lots of family-friendly and accessible places to go, creating a vibrant night-time economy and improving the variety of retail space. The Council is also committed to preserving Tommyfield Market and providing a sustainable future for it.

Councillor Sean Fielding, Leader of the Council, said: "Since becoming Leader of the Council I have listened to what residents are saying about the future of the borough and I have undertaken a detailed review of the evidence.

"I believe that this refocus of our plans will be revolutionary for Oldham, bringing jobs, homes and investment into our town centre and will help to create a better place to work, live and visit.

"Oldham Town Centre is at the heart of our borough and the potential to create lasting change is immense. Together, we can Create a Better Place to secure the future of our town centre and ensure it thrives."



## Oldham Athletic teams up with Great Places to offer local employment training

Oldham Athletic is teaming up with Great Places Housing Group and Oldham Athletic Community Trust (OACT) to offer employment training for members of the community across Oldham.

A SIA course held across two weekends will provide local residents with the skills to work in the security industry and a SIA licence upon completion. The course, funded by Great Places, will offer preferential places to its customers and OACT project participants but is also open to members of the wider public.

Suitable candidates, who successfully complete the training, will also be guaranteed a job interview by Oldham Athletic for a role as one of their match day stewarding team. They will also receive ongoing support from Great Places Employability coach and EDU training to find employment.

Places are limited so preference will be given to those currently attending an OACT project and Great Places customers. However, anyone interested should register in case places become available.

Commenting on the upcoming programme, Rebecca Cremin, Community & Partnerships manager at Great Places said: "Great Places is delighted to be working in partnership with OACT and EDU training. This project provides local residents with a great employment opportunity and the chance to establish a career with real prospects in the security industry." The four-day course will take place on 29 February and the 1, 7 and 8 March 2020 at the EDU Training Centre.
