

Celebrating 10 years of Gateways to Oldham PFI initiative

New exhibition celebrates 10th anniversary of Gateways to Oldham PFI initiative.

The Mayor of Oldham, Councillor Zahid Chauhan, was one of the guests to attend an event hosted by Great Places and award-winning local history charity Manchester Histories at Gallery Oldham on 16 September to mark the launch of an exhibition to commemorate the tenth anniversary of the 'Gateways to Oldham' housing and regeneration venture.

The ten-year £113m Public Finance Initiative (PFI), delivered by the Inspiral Oldham Consortium, made up of Great Places Housing Group and Wates Living Space, has transformed four areas across Oldham: Crossley in Chadderton, Dew Way in Westwood Primrose Bank in Medlock Vale and Keswick Avenue in Fitton Hill. 'Gateways to Oldham' has included the construction of new homes, refurbishment of existing homes and the creation of two community centres.

The exhibition Your Home, Your Voice, Your Place: A Celebration of Community and Heritage is culmination of the six-month Manchester Histories' project commissioned by Great Places. It involved interviewing people who have lived in these four areas before the regeneration work started and documenting their memories along with those of the local and wider community. The aim was to connect residents with those who've gone before and those who will come after.

The PFI residents shared their experiences with oral historian, Heather Roberts who with artists Katie McKeever, Laura Jones, and Millie Sheppard, curated a unique archive of recordings, films, art, and crafts.

The exhibition showcases an array of paintings, poetry, textiles, and film, all inspired by the themes of "home" and "memories."

A book is also planned to follow up this exhibition, and the oral histories will be stored as archives with Manchester Histories, and shared with Oldham Local Studies and Archives when they are based in their new home.

Ryan Smith, Great Places Head of Neighbourhoods for the central region, added:

"This is a landmark year for everyone involved with Gateway's to Oldham, in particular the residents of the neighbourhoods who have seen and been an integral part of their transformation over the past ten years.

We're delighted with the exhibition, and we hope that it will provide a long-lasting reminder of the tenth anniversary for years to come and can be enjoyed by members of the local community."

"Your Home, Your Voice, Your Place" is on at the exhibition at Gallery Oldham, 35 Greaves St, Oldham OL1 1AL until December 2, 2023.

We caught up with Tracy Richardson Great Places' Neighbourhood Coordinator for Primrose Bank, Fitton Hill and Dew Way in Oldham, to find out more about her role and how she is finding it.

What is your role as Neighbourhood Coordinator?

My role is to deliver Housing Management Services across Primrose Bank, Fitton Hill and Dew Way in Oldham. Including rent collection/queries, dealing with anti-social behaviour and safeguarding issues. I also coordinate monthly estate walkabouts on each scheme with Oldham Council, working collaboratively with our partners to ensure all KPIs are met and more importantly, to avoid incurring any financial penalties from the Council. A fun part of my role is supporting events at The Primrose Centre, by helping to run the activities for the local community and being available for customers if needs be.

Have you always worked in the Housing Sector?

No, I started work in an accounting environment becoming an Accounts Office Supervisor in a large manufacturing business. I always enjoyed dealing with customers and took on a customer-facing role at Oldham Council's Housing Department, which eventually became First Choice Homes Oldham (FCHO). I was fortunate enough to be chosen as one of the FCHO employees to transfer over to Great Places along with the properties which were to become the Oldham PFI.

What are your aims and objectives as Neighbourhood Coordinator?

I strive to make a positive difference within my role and always look for ways to improve and provide the highest level of service delivery. I am a very dedicated Neighbourhood Coordinator and thrive on achieving high levels of customer satisfaction, always aiming to support and empower our customers to improve their own lives, take pride in their homes and the environment that they live in.

What do you most enjoy about your role?

Over the twelve years that I have worked at Great Places, I have been a part of probably the biggest regeneration project of the housing sector in Oldham. Witnessing once run-down estates, suffering from years of underinvestment and seeing them grow into the thriving communities that they are today. I enjoy working with customers, understanding their individual needs and supporting them in the best way that I can. I love the variety of the role, every day is different and brings new challenges but with this comes further opportunities to learn and develop.

What do you like to do in your spare time?

I love anything eighties and attend several retro festivals and concerts every year. I am a big Manchester City fan and make sure that I am tuned in to all the matches. Furniture donation to help empower women

Great Places made a furniture donation to SAWN – Support and Action for Women's Network, after both our Oldham Office and Keyworker Accommodation (Great Places temporary accommodation for NHS workers) refurbishment. SAWN are an organisation dedicated to uplifting women from diverse backgrounds, empowering them to lead independent and fulfilling lives. They're based in Stockfield Mill in Chadderton, Oldham.

This furniture donation is more than just giving away used items; it is an act of kindness that will transform lives. For women who have experienced domestic violence, homelessness, or financial struggles, acquiring essential furniture can be a significant obstacle to regaining a sense of normality. By donating furniture, we create an environment that promotes healing, rebuilding self-esteem, and inspiring women to envision a brighter future.



Work underway at Fitton Hill to build 365 new homes

Our Chief Executive Matthew Harrison joined project partners and local councillors at an event to mark the start of work at Fitton Hill 'Hartshead View' which will deliver 365 new homes at the development in Oldham.

Matt was joined by partners from Countryside Partnerships, Sigma, and Oldham Council to the site situated on the brownfield land formally occupied by Fitton Hill County Infant, Fitton Hill Secondary Modern and Marland Fold Schools, as well as a now-demolished housing estate. Working in partnership with Great Places and Sigma Capital, Countryside will deliver 97 build-to-rent homes under Sigma's private rental brand, Simple Life, and 81 affordable houses to be managed by Great Places. The Leader of Oldham Council, Councillor Arooj Shah, and the Council's Cabinet Member for Housing, Councillor Elaine Taylor, were also taken on a tour of the site where they were able to learn more about the £83 million development.

Cracking Good Food slow cooker project

Rising energy costs are making it difficult for people nationwide to cook nutritious meals. In response, The Crossley Centre with support from Great Places has secured funding from HUBBUB to deliver a new project in partnership with Cracking Good Food to provide slow cookers to people in need from The Crossley Centre in Oldham.

Slow cookers are a more energy-efficient way to cook than a standard oven, and they can be used to prepare large batches of food that can be eaten that day or frozen for later. The project aims to help customers save money on their energy bills, eat healthier meals, and build confidence in their cooking skills. Each week, for six weeks people who received a slow cooker receive a free slow cooker recipe kit to empower affordable, tasty and nutritious cooking.



Reducing food waste and empowering communities

Great Places' Crossley Community Centre in Oldham received funding from award-winning environmental organisation Hubbub to set up a Community Fridge.

A site where local people can share food, including surplus from supermarkets, local food businesses, producers, households and gardens, a Community Fridge helps prevent food waste. The Fridge locations also create a space that brings people together to eat, connect, and learn new skills.

So far, the project has proved a huge success with an average of 25-30 households accessing the fridge every week; almost four tons of surplus food and household items have been given out since. As part of the Community Fridge offer Feed My City comes along each week to supply the community with hot meals.

The Community Fridge is available to anyone in the community and opens every Wednesday between 2pm and 4pm (whilst stocks last). It is located at Crossley Community Centre, 323 Denton Lane, Chadderton, OL9 9GA.



Community Information Day

The Crossley Centre recently hosted a Community Information Day. The event was in partnership with Oldham Council and we had 13 organisation offering information and advice to those in the community as well as lots of things to keep the kids busy during a rainy day in half term and plenty of delicious food and refreshments on offer.

We had 140 local residents attend the community centre for this event. Andy Wilson, Financial Resilience Energy Advisor at Great Places attended the event offering support around energy to customers which is going to be much needed once again this year. It was great to hold such a successful event that was supported by community partners.



Commemorating the Peterloo Massacre

On 14 November 2023, Great Places will be holding an event at The Crossley Centre to unveil a plaque that has been commissioned to commemorate the Peterloo Massacre. The Mayor of Oldham, Councillor Zahid Chauhan, and Councillor Colin McLaren will be guests at the event to unveil the plaque which will be mounted this month. A member from the Peterloo Memorial Society will be coming along to speak at the event and will be giving an insight into what happened at Peterloo in 1819.



Tenants Satisfaction Measures (TSM's) survey

Oldham Council recently ran a survey to find out customers' views on their homes and the services they receive from Great Places and Wates on behalf of Oldham Council. We'd like to thank all the customers who have responded to the survey sent out by Oldham Council.

Tenant Satisfaction Measures (TSMs) introduced by the Regulator of Social Housing were included in this year's survey, and cover repair, building safety and complaint handling. We encouraged customers to give their feedback to provide the Regulator, and Oldham Council with valuable information which will be used to assess our performance. We will publish key findings and how we plan to act on the results in a future briefing to all customers after April 1 2024.



News from the Wider Borough



Saving the Pennine Way in Oldham

If you enjoy the great outdoors, you'll be happy to know that almost 1km of the Pennine Way in the Oldham area is being restored this Autumn.

Oldham council have received funding totalling £43,173.01 from Natural England via the Pennine National Trails Partnership to improve the trail in the Oldham area, starting from Haigh Gutter, Denshaw on the A640 and north-west from there. Providing a further £7,618.76 themselves, Oldham council are using this funding to replace the existing eroded pathway with a new gritstone surface, which will be much easier to walk on.

This is fantastic news for the Pennine Way, which is a Site of Special Scientific Interest with a variety of wildlife, and is the oldest national trail in England, stretching a full 431km from the Peak District to the Scottish Borders. With more and more people discovering the beautiful countryside since the pandemic, it's more important than ever to ensure that the landscape is looked after so that everyone can enjoy it, and as Councillor Chris Goodwin commented, this work will 'ensure it is accessible for years to come'.

The works on the trail within the Oldham area are part of a series of projects with this in mind, and started in mid-October. Expected to take roughly a month, this stretch of the Pennine Way should be ready for a crisp Winter Walk by mid-November, and the path will still be open to the public in the meantime.

But if you'd rather wait, there's also lots to be discovered with the Oldham Way! This 42-mile trail has seven different sections: some more challenging for those who love to hike; but also some easier towpaths and canal sides; as well as Daisy Nook Country Park, which is perfect for families.

Places for Everyone consultation stage approved in Oldham

Places for Everyone is a joint development plan between Oldham and eight other Greater Manchester districts to decide on the future of housing developments in each borough.

Part of the process involves consulting members of the public, and in early October, Oldham Council's Cabinet Committee approved recommendations to move onto the consultation stage. Once all councils have also approved this, there will be an eight-week period for the public to have their say on a set of recommendations made by the Inspectors examining the development plan. These recommendations were to modify some of the plan's policies and allocations, not the vision and objectives of the plan as a whole – and the consultation with the public is strictly for comments on these modifications only.

The proposed changes include shifting the time period from 2020-2037 to 2022-2039, as this way it can be ensured that the plan covers a minimum 15-year period beginning from when it is currently on track to begin. They also include minor boundary changes to allocations at Broadbent Moss and South of Rosary Road.

Building more affordable homes in Oldham is at the heart of Places for Everyone, and other modifications include calls to increase the capacity of residential properties at Chew Brook Vale from 90 to 138 homes and to reduce the amount of commercial, leisure and retail facilities by 3,000 square miles.

These recommendations have followed examinations by inspectors appointed by the Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities at public hearing sessions held between November 2022 and July 2023. It's always important for us to help tackle the problem of damp and mould in our homes. Everyday jobs around the house like washing and drying clothes, cooking, and bathing all release moisture into the air, creating condensation. If this continues for a long period of time, it will eventually cause damp and mould to begin to grow.

To prevent this problem from starting you can follow some of the of the advice below:

Produce less moisture:

- Dry clothes outdoors where possible.
- Avoid drying your washing on a radiator.
- Always cover pans when cooking and do not leave the kettle boiling

Remove excess moisture:

Wipe down windows, windowsills, walls and shower walls every morning to remove condensation. Just opening a window isn't enough.

Ventilate to remove moisture:

- Open your windows and throw back the sheets or duvets to air the bed and bedding.
- Clear windowsills of clutter that will restrict opening the window.
- Avoid overfilling cupboards and wardrobes as this prevents air circulation.
- Don't block air vents in your home

Regulate your heating

- In cold weather, the best way to keep rooms warm and avoid condensation is to keep low background heat on all day, rather than short bursts of high heat, and it's cheaper!
- Avoid using portable gas heaters

Defective plumbing

Leaks from water and waste pipes are common and can affect both external and internal walls and ceilings. The affected area looks and feels damp to the touch and remains damp whatever the weather conditions outside. A quick examination of the water and waste pipes could find the source of the problem.
